## As histórias do Natal

#### Papai Noel e Suas Renas

Um dos personagens mais conhecidos do Natal é, sem dúvida, o Papai Noel. A lenda do bom velhinho vem de São Nicolau, um bispo do século IV, conhecido por sua generosidade e amor por presentear as crianças. Com o passar dos séculos, a figura de São Nicolau evoluiu para o Papai Noel que conhecemos hoje—um homem alegre, de barba branca, roupas vermelhas, que voa pelo mundo em um trenó puxado por renas.


## Christmas Stories

















































## December 1: Write a Letter to Santa Claus.

Fold your letter carefully, put it in an envelope, and write the address: Santa Claus, North Pole.


If you want Santa to receive it quickly, you can give it to your parents or leave it under the Christmas tree. Maybe an elf will come and take it to him!



#### December 2: Make Summer Lemonade with a Twist



#### North Pole Lemonade - A Summer Christmas Treat

Objective: Create a special summer lemonade, decorated with Christmas themes, to bring a little bit of North Pole magic to the warm Brazilian climate.

#### Materials Needed:

Cup Customization: Before serving the lemonade, ask the kids to decorate their cups with additional Christmas-themed stickers like reindeer, stars, or Christmas trees.




#### Benefits:

#### Materials Needed:


- 1. White paper (you can also use colored paper for a fun twist!)

- 6. Crayons, markers, or colored pencils (optional, for extra decoration)


#### Why Snowflakes?





#### December 4: Read a Christmas Story with the Family


















# EXTRA ACTINIES





#### December 6: Christmas Cookie Baking Day.

Today is the day to make Ensino Bilin's traditional gingerbread cookies! This activity is a wonderful opportunity to get kids involved in the kitchen, create special memories, and share the Christmas spirit in a fun way.





## Gingerbread Cookie Recipe Ingredients:

2 cups of all-purpose flour
1/2 cup of margarine
1 egg
1 cup of brown sugar
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 teaspoon ground ginger
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
Sprinkles (for decoration)

These cookies are a tradition at Ensino Bilin, and they are perfect for making with children, creating fun memories while spreading the Christmas spirit!

In a large bowl, cream together the margarine and brown sugar until smooth.

Add the egg and mix well until fully combined.

Add the flour ground singer, baking powder, and salt. Mix everything until you

Add the flour, ground cinnamon, ground ginger, baking powder, and salt. Mix everything until you get a firm, consistent dough.


Wrap the dough in plastic wrap and refrigerate for about 30 minutes.

Preheat the oven to 180°C (350°F).

Roll out the dough on a lightly floured surface to about 0.5 cm thick. Use Christmas-themed cookie cutters to cut the dough into fun shapes.

Place the cookies on a greased or parchment-lined baking sheet.

Bake for about 10 to 12 minutes, or until the edges of the cookies are lightly golden. Let the cookies cool completely before decorating with your choice of toppings.





#### December 6: Gingerbread Cookie Gift Day

After baking your delicious gingerbread cookies, it's time to share the Christmas spirit by turning them into beautiful gifts! This activity will help teach the children about generosity, kindness, and the joy of giving during the holiday season.

Set up a small station with everything the kids will need: ribbons, plastic bags, festive boxes, markers, stickers, colored paper, and craft supplies for making tags.

Explain to the children that today they are going to be "Santa's little helpers" by wrapping the cookies to spread Christmas joy to others.




Encourage the children to make each gift a little different, adding their own creative touches.





#### December 8: Make Christmas Ornaments with Natural Elements

Let's create Christmas ornaments using natural elements found outdoors, such as leaves, flowers, seeds, and seashells. This activity not only celebrates Christmas but also connects the family with nature while enjoying the warm summer weather in Brazil.

Materials Needed: Seashells, leaves, small branches, dried flowers, seeds, small pinecones (if available), twine or colored ribbon, hot glue (under adult supervision), acrylic paint (red, green, gold, silver), glitter, brushes, scissors, cardboard or small pieces of wood (optional).

Theme Suggestions for the Ornaments:

Seaside Christmas: Paint seashells with festive colors and add glitter.

Golden Leaves: Paint dried leaves with gold paint and add red bows.

Snowy Pinecones: If you have pinecones, paint the tips white to look like they are covered in snow.

Use this activity to talk about how Christmas is celebrated differently around the world, but the main idea is to spread joy and love.

Enjoy the summer weather by doing the activity outdoors, in the backyard or on the porch. This helps avoid the mess indoors and makes it more fun!

#### Step-by-Step:

- 1. Go to your garden, park, or beach and collect natural elements to use for the ornaments. Gather seashells at the beach, pretty leaves from the park, or pinecones and small branches. This turns the project into a mini outdoor adventure!
- 2. Clean all the natural elements. Wash the seashells and let them dry completely. For the leaves, pinecones, and flowers, let them dry in the sun for a few hours if they are wet or damp.
- 3. Use acrylic paint to paint the seashells and leaves. Choose festive colors like red, green, gold, and silver. If you want, add glitter for a sparkly holiday touch. Leaves can be painted just around the edges, and seashells can be decorated with designs like snowflakes or festive stripes.
- 4. Once the elements are painted and dry, glue them onto pieces of cardboard or small wood bases for more stability. Combine different elements, like a painted seashell with a dried flower and a leaf. Be creative! You could even make small "Christmas arrangements." Use hot glue to secure all the elements in place. Let it dry for a few minutes.
- 5. Cut pieces of twine or ribbon and glue or tie them to the top of the ornament. This will be used to hang them on the Christmas tree or other places around the house. If you prefer, make a small hole in a large seashell to pass the twine through.
- 6. After everything is dry, take the ornaments to the Christmas tree or hang them elsewhere, like on doorknobs, windows, or even on the porch.
- 7. If you have extra materials, make an ornament to give to a neighbor or friend. It's a lovely way to share the holiday spirit!














#### December 9: Christmas Card Crafting and Kindness Notes

Materials Needed: Colored Paper (like construction paper or colored cardstock), colored pencils, markers, crayons, scissor, glue, glitter, buttons, beads, decorative ribbon, fabric paint, envelopes and anything else you find necessary to make the card-making process more enjoyable and creative!

After school, let the kids unwind by making handmade Christmas cards. Set up a simple crafting station with colored paper, markers, stickers, and anything sparkly. Encourage them to decorate the cards with Christmas motifs like Santa, snowflakes, or reindeer.

sk the kids to write a short note inside each card for a family member, friend, or neighbor. It could be something they appreciate about that person, or simply a wish for a happy holiday season. If they want, they can also make extra cards to give to someone in the community, such as an elderly neighbor or a local shopkeeper, spreading holiday cheer beyond just the family.








#### December 10: Visit a Shopping Mall to See Santa Claus.

Today the family will visit the shopping mall to see Santa Claus and the kid will hand-deliver the letter they wrote on the first day of the advent calendar. They will enjoy the festive decorations and take a photo with Santa.

Encourage the child to dress in Christmas-themed clothing—maybe a fun reindeer T-shirt, a Santa hat, or anything festive. Dressing up adds excitement to the whole experience and makes it feel even more special!

Head to the shopping mall to meet Santa Claus. Many malls have a beautifully decorated Christmas area with Santa's chair, Christmas trees, elves, and other magical decorations. The child can bring the letter they wrote on December 1st to hand-deliver it to Santa. It makes the visit even more meaningful, and they can remind Santa of their wishes for Christmas.

- 3. Add cotton balls or artificial snow around the figures.
- 4. Place the clear cup upside down over the figures and glue it to the base.
- 5. Decorate the edge with tinsel and add a personal message.
- 6. Let the glue dry completely and display your snow globe as decoration or a gift.

#### Reindeer Oatmeal Recipe

#### Ingredients:

1 cup rolled oats

2 cups milk (or water, or plant-based milk)

1 tablespoon honey or maple syrup

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1/4 teaspoon cinnamon

1 tablespoon edible glitter or colored sugar (optional, for a festive touch)

Fresh fruit for decoration (e.g., strawberries, blueberries, banana slices)

1 tablespoon chopped nuts (e.g., almonds or pecans)

1 tablespoon raisins or dried cranberries (for "reindeer noses")



#### Instructions:

In a saucepan, combine the rolled oats and milk. Cook over medium heat, stirring occasionally, until the oats are soft and the mixture has thickened (about 5-7 minutes).

Stir in the honey or maple syrup, vanilla extract, and cinnamon. Mix well to ensure everything is evenly combined. For a festive touch, sprinkle a little edible glitter or colored sugar into the oatmeal and mix gently.

Pour the oatmeal into bowls. Use the fresh fruit to create "reindeer faces": Strawberries or banana slices can be used for the reindeer's nose. Blueberries can be used for the eyes. Use the chopped nuts to represent the "antlers." Add raisins or dried cranberries for extra decoration or as smaller details like the reindeer's "hooves."


#### How to play:

#### December 15: Do you want to build a snow man.



Once your fake snow is ready, mold it into three different-sized snowballs to create a snowman. Stack them on top of each other to form the snowman shape.

Use buttons to give your snowman eyes and buttons on his body, add twigs for the arms, and place a small hat on top. You can even make a carrot nose using paper or clay!

### Gingerbread Cookie Recipe Ingredients:

2 cups of all-purpose flour
1/2 cup of margarine
1 egg
1 cup of brown sugar
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 teaspoon ground ginger
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
Sprinkles (for decoration)

In a large bowl, cream together the margarine and brown sugar until smooth.

Add the egg and mix well until fully combined.

Add the flour ground singer, baking powder, and salt. Mix everything until you

Wrap the dough in plastic wrap and refrigerate for about 30 minutes.

Preheat the oven to 180°C (350°F).

Roll out the dough on a lightly floured surface to about 0.5 cm thick. Use Christmas-themed cookie cutters to cut the dough into fun shapes.

Place the cookies on a greased or parchment-lined baking sheet.

Bake for about 10 to 12 minutes, or until the edges of the cookies are lightly golden. Let the cookies cool completely before decorating with your choice of toppings.
